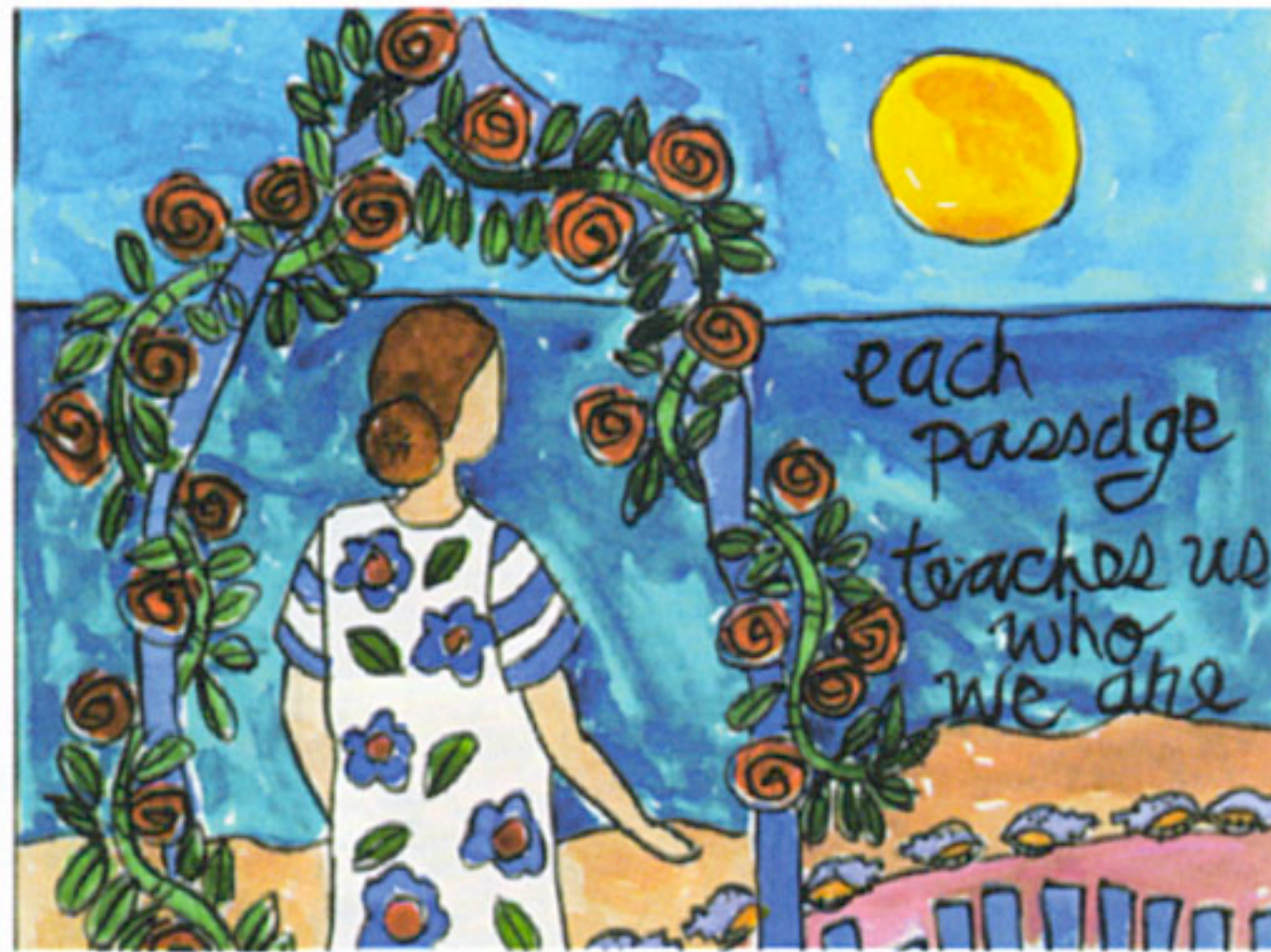

our side, all will be well. We are reminded in James 1 to “Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance.”

God's eyes are on the faithful. Even if this is the worst day of your life, it is the day that the Lord has made. And if all things work together for good for those that love the Lord, then so shall this. God has told us to fear not, because He is with us. I want to faithfully turn to God, no matter the difficulty of the

passage, lifting my voice in praise for this opportunity to draw closer to Him.

If we believe that He knew us before we were in the womb, and that He knows every heart and mind, then we have to believe that whatever it is that is happening now, is not outside His knowledge and purpose. Let us remember what Jesus taught over and over to those who sought His help and healing—“It shall be done to you according to your faith.”
